These strong women are pillars in their communities — providing schools and clinics where there were none, speaking out against injustice and family-based violence, negotiating with mining companies for better environmental and community outcomes, gaining better access to water and sewerage, and providing pathways to employment for women. Late last year, our Chair, Karen Milward, and Director, Karen Jacobs, were thrilled to be invited to the 2023 Kimberley Aboriginal Women's Council (KAWC) roundtable by Janine Dureau, Chair of KAWC and winner of the 2023 Bill Armstrong AO Human Rights Award. It was an uplifting event themed 'Think Global – Act Local' where more than 100 women gathered on Yawuru Country on Western Australia's Kimberley coast. Workshops covered women's wellbeing and healing, mentoring, leadership, empowerment and resilience.

JD Mechanical Solutions are a First Nations' owned and run mobile mechanic business based on Arrernte Country in the Northern Territory. Danni and her partner Josh, a qualified diesel mechanic, started the business in 2022 serving remote and local communities surrounding Mparntwe (Alice Springs).

The business is an active part of the community — not only providing employment opportunities for First Nations' people, but JD Mechanical Solutions is also a major sponsor of the local Alkamilya Women's Football Club.

Danni and Josh approached Community First Development with their interest in developing key documents to grow and expand their business. They were particularly looking for assistance to write a Capability Statement that would support tender applications to local Aboriginal organisations.

Senior Community Development Officer, Alex, who is based in Alice Springs, connected JD

Mechanical Solutions with skilled volunteer, lan, a mechanic and

carpenter who also has business management expertise. Ian worked alongside Danni and Josh remotely before meeting face-to-face for a two-day intensive visit to Alice Springs where they developed the key documents together.

Tranby Aboriginal Co-operative is an independent Aboriginal-controlled organisation based in Sydney, NSW. Since 1957, Tranby has demonstrated the power of Aboriginal-led education as self-determination in action.



When Indigenous adults are supported, listened to, and given the skills they need to thrive, families and communities have the chance to heal.

Whether it be through trade-based skills or legal studies, Tranby provides education opportunities for mothers, fathers and grandparents, so they can share the positive impacts of education with their young ones.

Community First Development first connected with Tranby more than a decade ago in 2013. We've worked on a number of projects together, including marketing strategy, grant assistance, graphic design, and communications support.

It's an honour to be invited back to work alongside this inspiring community again. Senior Community Development Officer, Emma, connected Tranby with one of our newest volunteers, Sarah. Tranby invited Sarah to meet with staff members at their campus in Glebe to discuss providing graphic design support for key communication materials, such as their Annual

CANBERRA, ACT

Since 2014, Burrunju Aboriginal Art Gallery has been a crucial part of the community as the only Aboriginal owned and run art gallery in Canberra. The name Burrunju holds significant meaning, referring to the "ruined city of Arnhem Land" and the resting place of founding members' totem, the saltwater catfish.

Burrunju provides the First Nations' community with culturally appropriate programs to improve resilience and wellbeing, create meaningful and sustainable employment, and support the passing on of culture and heritage to younger generations.

The unique art gallery also offers the wider community with insights into First Nations' heritage through art displays, cultural activities and programs. Tourists can come along for a visit and see the beauty of the local Aboriginal culture. Not only are there gorgeous artworks available for purchase, but there is also a space for the community to enjoy some art therapy by learning to paint or make artefacts.

All proceeds from artwork and artefacts sold in the gallery are invested directly back into supporting local artists, whether it's by providing a source of income for artists or purchasing art supplies for the community space.

FOR A STRONG FUTURE

Sunbury Aboriginal Corporation provides support across the shire of Hume in Victoria. Because there is no other Aboriginal group operating in this area, Sunbury's dream is to be a valuable resource to the local service system, education providers, and community groups. They also strive to be an asset to the community by providing support and advice on local Aboriginal issues.

This incredible community has created a special place that is truly welcoming as a culturally safe environment for locals to join workshops, group gatherings, and events throughout the



year. Sunbury hosts programs such as a Koorie children's playgroup and an event for high school students where they discuss issues they're passionate about in a "Ted Talk" format.

Sunbury first approached Community First Development to be part of their story in 2021. More recently, in October, Senior Community Development Officer, Jacob, visited Sunbury to yarn about the upcoming goals of the community, identifying a clear vision of their next steps.

We got a chance to see the space, which included a community room, native botany garden and mural, within an old courthouse and located next to a police station.
